

Assuming you're not using campsites then you just have to be a bit resourceful.

Fresh Water..

Not normally a problem, you will see public taps in various locations all over Greece, its usually ok for your tank but pour a glass first and look at it and take a sip before filling your tanks.

Consider a few spare collapsible water containers to supplement the main tank if yours is small. A watering can is very handy for decanting as well. You can also take a solar shower with you, fill it and store it in the garage between trips in your waste bucket in case of leaks, its much nicer showering outdoors and washing all the sand off.

One option is to time water refills for when you fill up with diesel and ask for water then. Try to fill about a $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ tank of diesel at a time for more opportunities for water. I doubt you'll get refused. We have found its usually best to keep an eye out for Revoil Garages as they usually have a dedicated tap where you can fill up but many others are possible.

If you have refillable gas bottles or tank the number of LPG outlets is now widespread, ask for water when you refill these as well.

Another option is at marinas or ports which are plentiful along the coast, although you might have to pay a few €'s for the privilege. Some also have public toilets nearby, you might get lucky and find a tap.

Beach showers are another option, just unscrew the rose (if it is still there) and decant into a container. Some also have a tap near the base as well. I have adapted a length of hose which you can slip over the outlet so you don't have to lift your container too high. Worth mentioning that some have water that comes from long exposed runs of pipe that has been subject to the heat of the sun, run it for a while before filling, of course if this is the case you can also consider having a free hot shower first before filling!

Also, beware and check first, as some water from beach bars and showers can sometimes come from raised static storage tanks, the water could have been standing for a while so I wouldn't recommend this option for your motorhome tank.

Grey water...

This rarely poses a problem. The best way is to decant into a bucket regularly and distribute responsibly into hedgerows, verges etc. You can use it as a flush for your Cassette tanks as well if you don't have access to fresh water at the time.

Toilet waste...

This is usually the most problematical as public toilets are not widespread and there are virtually no aires or motorhome service points in Greece.

Firstly, its best not to put your toilet paper down the cassette. Greek toilet pipes are smaller bore to the norm as you're probably aware and paper could block the pipes in toilets. Use a small container next to your loo for the paper, its what they do out there and you'll soon get used to it.

Urine is what fills up the cassette quickest imo, discretely peeing somewhere else (obviously easiest for the male of the species!) will greatly increase the time between emptying.

If you have the space and payload then a second cassette will also double the time between empties.

As mentioned previously, ask if you can use the toilet while you're refuelling with diesel or LPG or

try marinas.

As mentioned above there are some but not many public toilet blocks in Greece. You might find the occasional one in towns/villages or marina/port areas and motorway service areas that you could use, some might have a tap as well, but some can be pretty grim. Always leave cleaner than when you found it goes without saying, sometimes that's not a problem!

You also occasionally come across derelict toilet blocks, we've found several, as long as the drainage is still functional then it should be ok to empty down the toilet bowls but be advised, some of these can be in a terrible state and are not for the faint hearted!

I always empty whenever I see an opportunity even if the cassette is only half full, it might mean using more toilet fluid but that is a small price to pay, or consider fitting a Sog before you go.

You'll also see tavernas and beach bars offering overnight parking, usually as long as you have a meal, chances are you'll be able to take on water and maybe empty your toilet here as well if you ask nicely.

Last resort is to bury your waste in a remote location well away from roads and civilisation. We carry a folding shovel just in case.
